

# Town places 8th out of 83 in '09 energy challenge

The results of the *Count Me In!* Community Energy Challenge show Orangeville has some room for improvement.

The Town ranked eighth out of 83 municipalities for number of pledges submitted and in the middle out of 49 municipalities for the electricity consumption challenge.

The province-wide challenge was held last Friday, August 14, between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m., coinciding with the anniversary of the 2003

## Turner to seek Liberal nomination in Dufferin-Caledon

Garth Turner is going to try for a third term in the House of Commons, this time as MP for Dufferin-Caledon.

The former MP announced this week that he has officially submitted his papers to seek the nomination, and that those papers have been accepted.

Mr. Turner, 60, represented the riding of Halton-Peel from 1988 until 1993, having been elected as part of the second Progressive Conservative majority government of Brian Mulroney. He sought the leadership of the party in '93 when Mr. Mulroney stepped aside, gaining 76 first-ballot votes before dropping out of the race eventually won by Kim Campbell.

Mr. Turner served as Minister of National Revenue in the short-lived Campbell government before losing his seat in the Tory debacle later that year.

He returned to Parliament representing Halton as a Conservative under Prime Minister Stephen Harper in the 2006 election, but soon found himself at odds with his leader and was bounced from caucus later that year. He joined the Liberals after briefly sitting as an independent, and was defeated in last year's federal election by Lisa Raiitt, now federal Natural Resources Minister.

Riding Association President Jeff May has also announced plans to seek the nomination. Attempts to contact him this week were unsuccessful.

No date has been announced for the nomination, but Mr. Turner said he expects that will happen soon.

Residents and businesses were asked to participate in the challenge in two ways – to sign up for the *Count Me In!* pledge drive prior to August 14, and to reduce electricity consumption that day.

The winners of the challenge were Kingston for electricity consumption reduction, and Sioux Lookout for pledges per capita.

Kingston won The Woodstock Cup for achieving a drop of 7.8 per cent in electricity consumption during the 12-hour assessment period compared with August 13.

The name of the award is taken from the City of Woodstock, which organized the "Blackout Day Challenge" for several years.

"August 14 was a tough day for energy consumption as we entered our first heat wave of a colder-than-usual summer and the humidex spiked," said Mayor Rob Adams.

Orangeville's energy consumption actually rose that day to 439 megawatt hours (MWh), compared to the previous Friday when energy consumption was 360 MWh. But for the purposes of the challenge, Friday's data was compared to the local August 13 energy consumption,

which was 423 MWh. "We have some work to do for next year's challenge and hopefully we can budget ahead to better promote the event and to have a free swim and a community barbecue to get people out of their homes," the mayor said.

"The good news is that Orangeville residents took the online pledge and we ranked eighth in that aspect of the challenge."

Mayor Adams noted that awareness-building is a big part of the challenge and energy conservation in general. Orangeville Hydro and Green Pathways encouraged business participation in the *Count Me In* Challenge

and signed up 114 businesses that agreed to power down on August 14. He reminds residents that they can compare their energy consumption to the average Orangeville home by taking the Town's online energy challenge, with a built-in calculator, at [www.orangeville.ca](http://www.orangeville.ca).

"If you are not using electrical appliances or fixtures, turn them off," Mayor Adams says. "Washing clothes in cold water saves energy, replace your incandescent light bulbs with CFL bulbs, use a programmable thermostat, run your appliances early in the morning or after 8 p.m., use a power bar to get rid of 'phantom loads', and take showers instead of baths. And remember to think conservation all year round."

Mr. Wirtz wished to state emphatically that this was not the case.

"This was a completely random, selfish act of violence by a known criminal. By no means did (Lenore) have any previous contact with this assailant in her life."

He also wanted to know that something positive has arisen from such a heinous act.

"At no time would we ever want anyone to experience this," said Mr. Wirtz. "Yet, for having gone through it, we have seen the better side of humanity."

He said the reaction of

the community "has been simply amazing," adding that the family has been constantly receiving flowers and cards of sympathy and encouragement from local residents and businesses.

There has also been a constant supply of dinners, which have been gratefully accepted. With her

immobilized left arm and a pre-existing arthritis in her right, Ms. Wirtz has been unable to perform many of the normal domestic tasks.

Mr. Wirtz is asking local residents to participate in a blood donor clinic to which Ms. Wirtz will be lending her name. Its time and location have yet to be announced.

## PLAN NUMBER 2-3-701 STRIKING HOME

This striking home, with its eye-catching turret and three-sided entry, will be an asset to any neighbourhood. And the inside lay-out is just as thoughtful as the exterior design. An offset entrance under a covered porch, carousel windows and a pointed roof, together with an abundance of windows, a shake roof and fish scales in the roof peak give the house a touch of class. Oval glass in the front door and windows on either side bring an abundance of natural light into the soaring foyer. Stairs up to the main floor lead to a great room that really lives up to its name. The entire family area stretches from the front to the rear of the house, providing generous open space for today's informal lifestyles. A decorative half-wall separates the staircase from the great room, which features a large gas fireplace with optional built-in entertainment units on either side. In the dining area, an optional buffet will provide extra space and a serving area for more formal meals. A sliding glass door opens to a sun deck with steps down to the back garden. The kitchen will please the cooks in the family, offering plenty of countertop work-space, as well as a walk-in pantry. A window with a view to the garden will make time spent at the kitchen sink seem less taxing. A central island adds to more storage and work-space options and will seat four for quick snacks or casual meals. The sleeping area is designed to encompass either three or four bedrooms, depending on the plan chosen, the four or the three-bedroom. The three-bedroom layout includes a large master suite at the rear with a boxed-out window, a walk-in closet and an expansive ensuite bathroom with a soaker tub, shower and double vanity. Bedrooms two and three at the front of the house share the main, three-piece bathroom. In the alternative four-bedroom plan, space for the fourth bedroom is obtained by slightly reducing the size of the master suite, which still retains a generous amount of space, with only a three-piece ensuite bathroom and a slightly smaller walk-in closet. In this plan, bedrooms three and four occupy the front of the house and bedroom No. 2 is tucked between the master suite and the third bedroom. They share the three-piece central bathroom. In both layouts, the bedroom adjacent to the stairway enjoys a view through the attractive carousel-shaped windows, as well as to the foyer below. On the basement level, double doors mark the entrance to the den, which could serve as a home office. A good-sized laundry room includes a handy countertop for folding clothes. The remainder of the basement is unfinished, offering roughed-in plumbing for a three-piece bathroom and a layout for two extra bedrooms, still leaving plenty of space for a recreation area. The house is 42 feet wide and 40 feet deep with 1,390 square feet of living space and an unfinished basement.
