for the construction of wastewater pumping and treatment infrastructure.

The work generally consists of the supplying of labour, materials and equipment for and construction of the following: a new raw sewage pumping station (the Emma Street Sewage Pumping Station); approximately 1250 m of 250 mm dia. forcemain; approximately 255 m of 150 mm dia. watermain; decommissioning and demolition of the existing wastewater treatment plant; a new Wastewater Treatment Plant including: headworks building, blower/sludge pumping building, administration/maintenance/ filter/UV building, aeration tanks, secondary clarifiers, biosolids tank, on-site wastewater pumping station, stormwater management pond, on site piping and treated effluent outfall; all mechanical and electrical power and control equipment; and integration of all processes.

Each Tender must be accompanied by a Tender Deposit in the form of a certified cheque or bid bond in the amount equal to or greater than ten percent of the Total Tender Price payable to the Township of East Luther Grand Valley.

A mandatory tender period site visit is scheduled for Thursday, November 12, 2009 commencing at 10:00 a.m. at the existing Emma Street Wastewater Treatment Plant. During the mandatory site visit, a test hole will be dug at both the WWTP site as well as the Emma Street Pump Station site.
